Below are some questions that prospective students may have about the Masters in Adolescent Health programme at University of Galway and the application process. General Inquiries about the Masters in Adolescent Health Programme

How is the Masters in Adolescent Health programme delivered?

The Masters in Adolescent Health programme was designed to accommodate working professionals and distance learners. This Masters can be completed in 1 year full-time, or 2 years part-time. It is delivered via a blended learning approach, with the option to complete fully online. All modules are delivered online over three evenings each week. There are also a series of face-to-face workshops on campus on the first Saturday of each month during term time (6 Saturdays across 1 year full-time). These workshops can also be attended online to meet students needs.

Is it possible to complete the part-time Masters while working full-time?

Yes, part-time Masters students can complete the programme while working full-time. The programme is delivered through a blended learning approach. This approach was selected to accommodate students' full-time or part-time work schedules.

How many students are admitted to the MSc programme each year?

The Masters in Adolescent Health programme will have up to 25 places each year.

Who has completed this Masters to date?

People from a variety of different professions and areas of interest related to adolescent health have completed the Masters to date. This includes but is not limited to teachers, SNA teachers, youth workers, social workers, health professionals (nurses, medical doctors, occupational therapists) students who recently completed their primary degrees in a variety of disciplines, parents and people with an interest in adolescent health advocacy. Each year the programme has a significant number of international students from a variety of backgrounds and professions adding to the rich learning environment.



What are the fees for this programme?

The EU fees for the full-time programme are €8,140 p.a EU and the Non-EU fees are €19,640. The EU fees for the part-time programme are €4,070.

How long does it take to complete the degree?

Students can complete the programme either on a full-time or part-time basis. On a full-time basis, the programme can be completed in one year. On a part-time basis, the programme can be completed in two years.

What are the admission requirements for NUI Galway's Masters in Adolescent Health programme?

Successful candidates will have a strong undergraduate record with a minimum of a 2.2 in a Level 8 in the social sciences, health sciences, medicine, or a cognate discipline. Applicants with a Level 7 with extensive experience working with adolescents will also be considered on a case-by-case basis. International applicants are required to have an equivalent degree from their university.



What are the admission requirements for international students?

International applicants are required to have an equivalent degree and submit their results from their undergraduate university. Applicants from countries where English is not the primary official language must also submit scores from the International English Language Testing System (IELTS). A minimum score of a 6.5 is required on the IELTS. Students who are citizens of the following English-speaking countries are exempt from submitting IELTS scores: Australia, Bahamas, Bermuda, Canada, Gambia, Ghana, Guyana, Jamaica, Kenya, Liberia, New Zealand, Nigeria, Seychelles, Sierra Leone, Trinidad and Tobago, Uganda, United Kingdom, United States, Zambia, and Zimbabwe.

Do international students have to take the IELTS even if all of their course work in their country was conducted in English?

If the primary native language of your country of citizenship is not English, you will be required to submit IELTS scores. In addition, if you were born internationally but are a permanent resident of Ireland or you have completed a degree at an Irish institution, you do not need to submit IELTS scores.

What type of undergraduate degree do I need to apply?

The field of adolescent health is a broad multi-disciplinary field. As such, applications to this programme come from a wide range of undergraduate and graduate programmes, including the social sciences, health sciences, medicine, humanities, sciences, and clinical programmes. All applicants must have either a Bachelor of Arts or Science degree. Applicants with graduate degrees will also be considered.

What are the application requirements?

Applicants are required to submit a Personal Statement that highlights their commitment to the field of adolescent health. Applicants should also submit a CV and two letters of recommendation. Applicants are required to submit their official

qualifications and exam results (transcripts). International applicants from countries where English is not the primary official language must also submit scores from the International English Language Testing System (IELTS).

Do I need to submit official transcripts?

Applicants are required to submit their official qualifications and exam results (transcripts). This is a requirement for all non-NUI Galway applicants and for NUI Galway graduates who did not receive their undergraduate degree(s) from NUI Galway. Applicants who have not yet graduated must submit their final transcripts on receipt.

Can final year students apply to the programme?

Yes, final year students are eligible to apply to the programme. However, if accepted to the programme, the offer would be conditional on certain criteria being met (e.g., final exam marks). When the conditions specified in the conditional offer are met and applicants have



provided evidence of the same (e.g., your final transcripts), they will automatically secure a place in the programme.

Can international students apply to this programme?

Yes, we accept applications from international applicants. Since our programme is delivered through a Blended Learning Approach, international students have the option to complete the programme while living in their home country or in Ireland.

When is the application deadline?

Offers for this programme will be made on an ongoing basis. Applicants are encouraged to apply as early as possible.

How much is the application fee?

The cost of applying is €35. This fee is non-refundable.

Who should write my letters of recommendation?

Applicants are required to submit two letters of recommendation with their application. We prefer if at least one of the references is from an undergraduate/graduate advisor or faculty in the major field of study. The second reference should be from a recent employer.

What should I put in my personal statement? What are you looking for in a student?

Your personal statement should highlight your commitment to the field of adolescent health. You should highlight what you want to do? Why? And why here, at NUI Galway? Your personal statement should be concise, clear, and specific. You should discuss your personal experiences and background that are relevant to the field of adolescent health. Your personal statement should be approximately 600 words.

Can I check the status of my application?

Select Option: Login/register
Enter username and password
Go to 'My Account' - top right-hand corner Select 'Status'

If I'm admitted, can I defer for a year?

The granting of a deferral will be considered on a case-by-case basis for students who have been accepted to and secured their place in the programme.
