Career Opportunities

Now is an excellent time for students to embark on a career in Archaeology. Ireland's National Development Plan calls for continued expansion of large public infrastructure projects (housing, transport, green energy) for the foreseeable future, and all of these projects will incorporate archaeological assessments and excavations. The heritage consultancy companies that undertake this archaeological work need large numbers of skilled graduates to fill positions as excavators, artefact specialists, surveyors, archaeological scientists, graphic illustrators, technical report writers, underwater archaeologists etc. In addition to employment with a heritage consultancy, there are also opportunities with the National Monuments Service, museums, and heritage tourism.

An undergraduate degree in Archaeology also provides excellent training in critical analysis, interpretation, and effective communication. These are all widely applicable and flexible skills that allow our graduates to adapt to the ever-changing social and economic conditions that characterize today's job market. In addition to careers in archaeology, typical career sectors for graduates include heritage, tourism, education, environment, culture, and media, but any industry where sustainable development and environmental impacts are concerns are potential employers.

Study Abroad

The Erasmus student exchange programme offers you the opportunity to study abroad in Year Three. Archaeology has an Erasmus agreement with Charles University (Czech Republic). Students taking a modern language can also study archaeology overseas. Our staff have international research links with universities in Europe and the USA, sit on the boards of a number of international research bodies, and have a teaching exchange with Lund University (Sweden).
