



Following recent investigations and neviews, it was highlighted that women had faced serious failings in their maternity care and a number of serious service deficits were identified. Confidence in Inish maternity services was undermined and it was clear there was a need for marked improvements. HICA developed national maternity standards using a partnership approach to show what safe, high-quality maternity services should look like.

5. Impact on Maternity Services

Question 3: What impact will the draft standards have on maternity services in Ireland when they are in place?

This guestion sought the views of participants on the impact the draft maternity standards would have on maternity services in Ireland when they are in place. Over three out of four (76%) respondents provided feedback to this question. Figure 4 represents the most common words used in respondents' feedback to this question.
