Student visa and residence permit	<ul> <li>Non-EU citizens:</li> <li>Some non-EU citizens need to apply for a visa to enter Sweden, and all non-EU citizens need to apply for a residence permit to stay longer than 90 days.</li> <li>Uppsala University will send a Letter of Acceptance by e-mail to each student requiring the document. The Letter of Acceptance is necessary to apply for a visa/residence permit. Financial supporting documentation	<ul> <li>Schengen agreement still have to apply for a residence permit before they arrive in Sweden.</li> <li>For non-EU/EEA citizens, the Swedish Migration Board requires that applicants support their visa/residence permit application with proof of sufficient funds for their entire time of stay. Please see Swedish Migration Agency for requirements.</li> </ul>	
Medical Insurance	<ul> <li>their entire time of stay. Please see Swedish Migration Agency for requirements.</li> <li>All students are insured by the insurance Student IN from Kammarkollegiet. This insurance provides emergency medical and dental coverage, home transport, personal property coverage, third-party liability, and legal protection. It provides coverage for the student's travel directly to and from Sweden from two weeks before and two weeks after the official term dates. Arrival days and Orientation Week	For the autumn term, the recommended days of arrival usually fall on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday one week before the start of term, whereas the spring term's recommended days of arrival usually are Friday and Saturday on the weekend before term starts. Accommodation	Uppsala University offers accommodation for exchange students through the contracted private company, The Uppsala University Housing Office, but housing is not guaranteed. The housing application is submitted from May 15 <sup>th</sup> – May 31st (for autumn) and November 15th – November 30th (for spring). Students with disabilities	Support for reading and writing difficulties/dyslexia, mental disorders, neuropsychiatric disorders, hearing impairment, visual impairment, physical disabilities, or chronic illnesses can be provided. To receive support, students must provide evidence of disability directly to Uppsala University's disability coordinators.	
	The type of support received is directly related to education and according to needs. Support is planned in collaboration with the student. Student Health Services	The Student Health Services is a team of specialists, such as psychologists and counsellors, all focused on student-related mental health issues, such as stress, etc. Students can receive counselling and take part in a variety of workshops. Please note that no general practitioner for medical and dental issues or emergencies is available at the Student Health Services.	
	The Student Health Centre also offers workshops on issues such as how to handle stress as a student. The Student Health Centre in Uppsala also has a light room to help students handle the darkness of the Swedish winter.

Student Social Life	The Nations in Uppsala are student associations run by students for students, and they are the hub of the Uppsala University student social life. Once a nation member, the Nation Card is also valid as a Student ID card. Membership in one nation gives access to all the other nations and also entitles students to discounts at many establishments. To access student life, a voluntary student union and 'nation' (student club) fee is charged, currently approximately SEK 380 per semester.

Uppsala University	Uppsala University (UU) is the oldest university in Scandinavia, founded in 1477. The Uppsala campus is located 70 km north of Stockholm and 30 km from the international airport Stockholm Arlanda, but there is also a separate campus in Visby on the island of Gotland, which lies in the Baltic Sea. The university has about 50 000 students. Uppsala University is one of the top 100 universities in the world according to major rankings and is home to the Uppsala Model of internationalization in firms.
