Minimum and maximum number of modules/credits to be taken in each semester/term	University of Galway uses the ECTS (European Credit Transfer System). ECTS is based on the principle that 60 credits is a measure the workload of a full-time student during one academic year, and correspondingly, 30 credits for a semester. (The student workload of a full-time study programme in Europe amounts in most cases to around 1500-1800 hours per year and in those cases one credit stands for around 25 to 30 working hours.) The number of credits that should be taken by a visiting student is a matter for his/her home university to determine.

Are students allowed to take cross-faculty modules? If yes, are there any restrictions?	Students are expected to take courses within their chosen School; admission to courses provided by other Schools cannot be guaranteed. Selecting courses outside of the chosen school may result in timetable clashes at exam time.	



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Can students take modules of a different level, e.g. students at Year 2 taking Level 3 modules?	This would depend on an assessment by the relevant University of Galway academic department of the students' ability, academic background and exam results up to the time of application.
Are there any special language courses for incoming exchange students prior to the exchange program start?	No, but a five-week course of English language classes is provided for international students – this course usually starts soon after the beginning of each semester. The course is free of charge and consists of two 2-hour sessions per week (evenings).
When will the academic transcripts of exchange students be sent?	Usually within about 6 weeks of the end of exams.

<p><u>Accommodation Office:</u></p>	<p>Helps students find accommodation, provides advice on accommodation issues, e.g. letting agreements, tenant rights and obligations, and help in the event of a dispute. Fact Sheets on a wide variety of accommodation issues are available from the service. Students are offered the following accommodation options: University approved residential accommodation complexes, private sector houses and apartments, hostels, lodgings.</p>
<p><u>Library and Information Services</u></p>	<p>Situated in the heart of the Campus. Visiting students will also feel very much at home with the range of international databases available via the Library website. Students may use their laptops throughout the Library, using the University's wireless network, and can also access the resources from home. All visiting students have access to all Library facilities – including off-campus access to electronic resources. It provides excellent support for students with disabilities and special needs. Users with a range of disabilities are very well served with a state of the art Adaptive Technology Centre</p>
<p><u>Computer and E-Mail Facilities:</u></p>	<p>PC Suites across the campus provide free of charge Internet and email facilities to registered students. Printing is charged on a per-page basis. A "wi-fi" computing service is available for students with suitably equipped laptops.</p>
<p><u>Student Health Services:</u></p>	<p>A Student Health Service is provided on campus, 9.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m., Monday to Friday, which is free and completely confidential. It is staffed by two doctors, two nurses, a physiotherapist and a sports injuries therapist. Please note that the Student Health Service does not cover the cost of prescribed medicine, hospitalization, optical or dental treatment. Students are therefore advised to have a thorough medical check-up before leaving home. Non-E.U. students are required to pay full charges for in-patient and out-patient services in a public hospital and all charges for doctors' services, drugs and medicines. Students who require private medical insurance should make arrangements for cover prior to departing from their home country, or alternatively they can contact Health Insurance Companies in Ireland, which offer private medical cover.</p>
